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As well as this Bio, be aware from "Skoll/FAQs" page that a certain LLC manages its investments, and that the Skoll Fund (vs. Foundation) has an original relationship with the "Silicon Valley Community Foundation," which, having come across my path separately, I know did not exist as an entity before the merger of two (also local to that area) major community foundations into that one — in 2006.

Silicon Valley Community Foundation went from assets \$1.1B (on its 2006 merger and startup under that name: there was no "survivor org." it was new. So Skoll Fund started under one of the earlier two that merged) to \$5.5B (recent). ALL of this is about investments, the "social" is just an add-on perk (imho) to attract investments, and keep the same leadership on top, globally, and their vision (global) of business and governments relationship on top too.

What is the relationship between the Skoll Fund and the Skoll Foundation?

The Skoll Foundation encompasses two separate corps: the Skoll Foundation (a private foundation) and the Skoll Fund (a public charity). The Skoll Fund, created in 1999, is a supporting org. associated with the Silicon Valley Community Foundation. The private foundation was launched in 2002.

Sir Ronald Cohen is Chairman of the Social Impact Investment Taskforce established by the G8 and The Portland Trust. He is a co-founder of Social Finance UK; co-founder Director of Social Finance USA, Social Finance Israel, Big Society Capital; and was co-founder Chair of Bridges Ventures. He chaired the Social Investment Task Force (2000-2010) and the Commission on Unclaimed Assets (2005-2007). In 2012 he received the Rockefeller Innovation Award for innovation in social finance. He was co-founder and Executive Chairman of Apax Partners (1972-2005), and a founder director of the BVCA and EVCA. He is a graduate of Oxford University and Harvard Business School and an Honorary Fellow of Exeter College. He is a director of Harvard Management Company and Vice-Chairman of Ben Gurion University. He is a former member of Harvard University Board of Overseers and former Trustee of the British Museum. In 2007, Sir Ronald published: "The Second Bounce of the Ball—Turning Risk into Opportunity"
